**Course Description:**

This course is designed as an overview course to give non-informatics major students a broad understanding of Informatics topics for big data and to get practical experience with key big data informatics techniques. Topics include roadmap of informatics, the data lifecycle, the role of the data scientist, brief introduction to machine learning and data mining, analyzing and exploring big data with real world use cases, introduction to big data management eco system, and data visualization. Homework assignments and projects will give students practical experience with important topics covered in the course. This class will be primarily individual and/or team study, with assigned readings, homework/projects assignments, a midterm exam, and a final.

**Recommended Preparation:**

A basic understanding of engineering principles and programming language is desirable.

- Examination behavior – any use of external assistance during an examination shall be considered academically dishonest unless expressly permitted by the teacher. <sup>[[1]]</sup><sub>[[SEP]]</sub>
- Fabrication – any intentional falsification or invention of data or citation in an <sup>[[1]]</sup><sub>[[SEP]]</sub>academic exercise will be considered a violation of academic integrity. <sup>[[1]]</sup><sub>[[SEP]]</sub>
- Plagiarism – the appropriation and subsequent passing off of another's ideas or words as one's own. If the words or ideas of another are used, acknowledgment of the <sup>[[1]]</sup><sub>[[SEP]]</sub>original source must be made through recognized referencing practices. <sup>[[1]]</sup><sub>[[SEP]]</sub>
- Other Types of Academic Dishonesty – submitting a paper written by or obtained from

another, using a paper or essay in more than one class without the teacher's<sup>11</sup> express permission, obtaining a copy of an examination in advance without the knowledge and consent of the teacher, changing academic records outside of normal procedures and/or petitions, using another person to complete homework assignments or take-home exams without the knowledge or consent of the teacher.

The use of unauthorized material, communication with fellow students for course assignments, or during a mid-term examination, attempting to benefit from work of another student, past or present and similar behavior that defeats the intent of an assignment or mid-term examination, is unacceptable to the University. It is often difficult to distinguish between a culpable act and inadvertent behavior resulting from the nervous tensions accompanying examinations. Where a clear violation has occurred, however, the instructor may disqualify the student's work as unacceptable and assign a failing mark on the paper.

**Return of Course Assignments:**
